Cross Cultural Healthcare Experience A Student's View

INITIATIVE

Hola! We were fortunate to be able to participate in Crouse Hospital College of Nursing's first Global Health Initiative trip to Guatemala in June. During a twelve day period, we held seven clinics in three different locations. Guatemala is a gorgeous country. Everything from the landscape to the people is beautiful. During our clinics, we saw over five hundred children and each child greeted us with a smile on their face.

The children would be physically assessed and then treated if necessary. Our supplies enabled each child to receive a month's supply of vitamins, a toothbrush, toothpaste and soap. They were also given a dose of Vitamin A for anemia and poor nutrition and two doses of Albendazole, an antiworming medicine for intestinal parasites.

This experience was life changing. To be able to help these children and see how happy and grateful they were made everything worth it. It was an amazing adventure filled with challenges. However, we would gladly participate in another trip of this nature and encourage others to do the same.

We want to thank everyone for their support and assistance in making this happen.

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Cross Cultural Healthcare Experience A Faculty's View

Crouse Hospital College of Nursing students and faculty had the opportunity to travel to Guatemala for a clinical elective this summer. Our project was to work with Children of God mission on a healthy belly de-worming project. The water in many areas of Guatemala is contaminated causing a worm infestation. This worm infestation contributes to both malnutrition and high rates of school absenteeism. The College of Nursing was very fortunate to go to Guatemala on the "Healthy Belly" initiative in order to help eradicate this problem.

I have always wanted to be part of a medical mission as long as I can remember because of a love of adventure, travel, and a good challenge. On this mission I learned the importance of serving. According to Doctor Rachel Remen, one of the earliest pioneers in the mind/body holistic health movement and the first to recognize the role of the spirit in health and the recovery from illness, service is paramount. She teaches me to differentiate between serving and helping. The act of helping, she maintains, suggests a sense of inequality. Moreover, she related that when one helps another, the relationship is unbalanced. The helper, being more powerful and stronger than the other, results in feelings of indebtedness. Service, on the other hand, connotes more of a sense of equality, ultimately leading to mutual healing. I observed this daily in Guatemala. I witnessed the joy and happiness that was infused into our students and faculty from those we were serving. I found the Guatemalan children both joyful and peaceful, despite circumstances that most of us cannot imagine. They taught me a great deal about gratitude and happiness. I learned that helping someone yields a sense of satisfaction whereas service results in a profound sense of gratitude. That was my epiphany! There was such a continuous flow of giving and receiving the whole time we were down there from everyone. I have never felt such a connection to others.

I also was able to witness nursing in its purest form. Although supplies of medications, technology, and other resources were certainly lacking, our care was not. Collectively, our physical assessment skills grew exponentially as we adapted and relied more on our own senses to obtain assessments. The ability to triage and prioritize grew stronger each day. Our students learned quickly and amazed all of us! We learned that, despite not being able to fix all of our patients' physical needs, it was the connection that we formed that was pivotal. We could make a difference. To watch this on a daily basis was nothing short of awe inspiring.

Encouraging cultural sensitivity was a primary goal of this mission. Ironically, I became more aware of our similarities. Everyone wants to feel respected and cared for. We all need to know that our lives matter. The relationship between the Crouse students and faculty and the Guatemalans was characterized by this respect. We focused on caring and this is inherent to our new curriculum. We had to collaborate to be effective.

In short, this experience has changed my life in so many ways. I have such a renewed respect for our profession and the power it has to heal. I can now discern between healing and curing. Because of Guatemala, I am a better nurse, educator and person.

From the bottom of my heart, I want to thank Ann Sedore making this trip come to fruition. I am a very grateful person.
