Husband Honors Nurse's Legacy of Selfless Giving Alumna Evelyn Colman Faulkner

Polge (Class of 1943) lived her life in service as a nurse and advocate for community healthcare. In memory of her selfless dedication to the health and wellbeing of others, her husband, Albert Polge, recently established the Evelyn Colman Faulkner Polge Scholarship Fund, an endowed scholarship through the Crouse Health Foundation. Investment income from the fund will be used each year to award scholarships in Evelyn's name to students attending the Pomeroy College of Nursing at Crouse Hospital.

Even at a young age, Evelyn Colman knew she wanted to be a nurse. After graduating from Valley High School in Syracuse, she lived



in student housing on Irving Avenue while attending our program, which was then known as the Crouse-Irving School of Nursing. In addition to working at Crouse-Irving Memorial Hospital for several years, she worked at a private practice and eventually became a nursing supervisor for the Onondaga County Health Department. In 1985, Evelyn retired after 42 years of caring for patients as a nurse and as a leader of health initiatives for the County.

Evelyn's first husband, Richard Faulkner, passed away in 1968. Sixteen years later, she married Albert Polge and they spent their lives together both in Syracuse and Florida. Lifelong friends from Crouse and the hospital itself stayed close in Evelyn's heart through her membership in the Crouse Hospital Nurses Alumni Association and as an avid reader of Crouse's *YourCare* and *Dialogue* publications. When Evelyn passed away in 2018, Mr. Polge contacted the Crouse Health Foundation to discuss establishing the nursing scholarship fund. "Evelyn gave without being asked and expected nothing in return," he said. "This scholarship fund is a very meaningful way to honor such a special woman."

Crouse Hospital Nurses Alumni Scholarships

Through the generous support of the Crouse Hospital Nurses Alumni, sixteen scholarships totaling \$7,500 are now being awarded to students who are either currently in our program or have been accepted to the Pomeroy College of Nursing to start in fall 2019. These awards came from investment income earned by the endowed Crouse Hospital Nurses Alumni Fund, and recipients were selected by the school based on academic achievement and financial need. At the request of the alumni association board, up to two of these scholarships have been specifically earmarked for LPNs who are continuing their education to become RNs. In January, another eight scholarships will be awarded for the 2020 calendar year in the name of Crouse Hospital Nurses Alumni from an outright donation of \$5,000 made by the association. These "split" scholarship disbursements - academic year versus calendar year - represent the College's goal to have monies available for students entering our program in both the fall and spring semesters. Our students are deeply grateful for this meaningful support, and our heartfelt thanks go to all the alumni whose continued involvement and generosity make these awards possible.


Joyce Wheaton ~ September 5, 2018

When we reach historical milestones, it can be tremendously inspiring to look back at where nursing once was, consider where it is now and set a vision for where it is going. In this spirit, when Crouse Hospital College of Nursing celebrated its 100th Anniversary in 2013, biographical profiles were requested and collected from many of our proud graduates. Wanda Van Arsdale's profile, handwritten in her distinctive script and mailed to the Alumni Office, is especially memorable. Her dedication, pride and love for the nursing profession—and especially Crouse Hospital—are felt in each of her wonderful memories spanning her 40+ year career. We share selected excerpts of her memories here.

"I graduated from high school in Pulaski in 1946. Prior to [graduation], I had made up *my mind that I wanted to be* a nurse. One evening, while I was helping my father feed the cows, I told him that I wanted to be a nurse. He immediately said, 'Wanda, there is nothing else I would rather have you be.' That was all the encouragement I needed.I got a job....and managed to save \$1000, which would pay for my school fees at Crouse Irving Hospital. (Point of interest- my admission fee was \$300, uniforms, books and medical, physical exams were included.)

We were the first class to have a half-day off for big holidays. We worked most weekends and had time off for classes only. The three [college] years went quickly and I knew I loved surgical nursing the most. Almost immediately after graduation I bought my first car, a Chevy 210. Our whole class missed the wonderful peanut butter and jelly sandwiches the Hospital kitchen would make for us everyday... I know that helped me add 30 pounds while I was in school!"

I was asked by the Dr's AJ and Lyman Spire to work as their private duty surgical nurse. Because we had some time [following graduation], I drove to Bradenton,Florida to work for a few months with three other new graduates. My friend Muriel's grandparents lived there, and there was a new hospital that was just built. We were hired immediately and went to work after a weekend to find a place to live. I worked in surgery, but none of us had the same time off so we couldn't go sightseeing. It didn't take long for everyone to want to return to Syracuse and Crouse -Irving Hospital.

I worked for Dr. Spire and loved being a surgical nurse. I loved the students and became close friends with Lena Davia, the OR head nurse. We were friends for life. After a few years, I realized that I was going 'no

place' financially. I needed to go back to school for my degree. I got a part time job in the ER at Crouse-Irving and went to Syracuse University to get a BS nursing degree.

By the fall of 1961, I finished [my Bachelor's degree] and got a job at Crouse with Cecilia Kennedy and Helen Parker. My first assignment was to help teach 'how to clean a patient bed'. After that I taught many of the second level classes that dealt with surgical nursing.I always felt my time with Dr. Spire helped me learn many nursing aspects about post-surgical care that books don't always provide. I always loved working with students."

As an instructor for the School of Nursing, Wanda became an expert at "firsts." She led many hundreds of students through their first patient baths, their first injections and even their first time walking into patient rooms wearing their nursing caps.



"I took early retirement in 1986 but kept working part time in the OR at Crouse and also at St. Joseph's Hospital. I actually finally retired completely in 1992. I kept my license for 10 more years, but didn't use it. I love to volunteer at Crouse when I can.I love to go to [Alumni] luncheons, too. I am enjoying being involved in the 2012 preparations for the 100th anniversary of the College. The students were always my life."

"I liked working here because of the people – faculty, staff, students – everyone at Crouse Irving Memorial."

- The New York Heritage Digital Collection, a web-based portal created to help people learn more about the historical events that shaped New York State, including Crouse Hospital's and our college's history.

In addition, for all of us who have enjoyed the display of archival materials at various Crouse events and the historical photographs displayed throughout our hospital campus (most recently in our new lobby and Emergency Department), we are reminded that these exhibits of our rich history are available to us because of Kris.

Kris is a proud 2013 recipient of the Medal of Honor from the Onondaga Historical Association, the highest honor that this organization can give an individual for contributions made to the cause of preserving and interpreting local heritage.

It goes without saying that the Crouse Health archives are near and dear to Kris' heart.

In lieu of a retirement gift, Crouse Health employees and the Crouse Nurses Alumni Association honored Kris with the establishment of a Crouse Health Foundation Archives Fund, presented to her at her retirement celebration. Kris expressed her great pleasure in knowing that these treasures will remain safe and well-cared for, ready to be shared and enjoyed by the next generation of students and employees, following her retirement.

Transitioning to an RN Role

The Manager of Nursing Relations and Retention ... now that's a mouthful! I joined the Crouse family in September 2018 in this newly created role, and it has been such a wonderful experience so far. I have the opportunity to collaborate with many different departments and am involved in a lot of different areas across the organization, but my primary focus in this role is working with our Pomeroy College of Nursing students as the manager of the Student Nurse Resource Pool.

Crouse Health created the Student Nurse Resource Pool in January 2018 to allow our students a flexible work opportunity where they can gain additional patient care experience to reinforce everything they learn in the classroom and during clinical experiences. Students are hired as per diem nursing assistants and float throughout the different patient care areas to practice their skills. Since September, we have grown the Resource Pool from about 20 to 60 employees! We have also expanded the program to other Syracuse area nursing students and added a summer component for 4-year nursing students. In this part of my job, I help to mentor and support our students and assist them in successfully transitioning to an RN role – hopefully at Crouse! We were lucky enough to retain all 6 of our December graduates on their first choice units, and are slated to retain 9 out of 10 May graduates as well!

It is amazing to develop relationships with the students and see them grow throughout their time here at Crouse, and we have also created a few professional development initiatives such as a shared governance committee and opportunities for student nurse assistants (SNAs) to orient new employees to further bolster their growth. This helps them to not only hone their clinical skills, but their leadership and teaching skills, too!

I also have the pleasure of working closely with the Human Resources department on nursing recruitment and assist with the nurse residency program as a facilitator, supporting new graduates through their first year of practice. I have the opportunity to oversee our hospital's Nursing Recruitment, Retention and Recognition Committees and also act as our DAISY Award Coordinator. These roles allow me to celebrate and foster growth in nursing through so many different avenues, and I like to think of myself as a Nursing Cheerleader!
