I hope this message finds you and your family well. As you can imagine, it has been a challenging and demanding six months that has required every individual to adapt during this unprecedented time in response to the pandemic.

One thing that was compelling throughout these past months of uncertainty was the dedication and commitment of our faculty and staff, as well as Crouse Health senior leadership to support our students as they adjusted to an online learning environment, which included a shift to

virtual clinical learning during the spring semester. They did a great job working together as a team to make it as seamless a transition as possible for our students. Our students demonstrated flexibility, resilience and courage during this time – character traits that will serve them well in their careers.

As we planned for the fall semester, our commitment to provide academic continuity and quality of instruction for our students remained at the forefront of our decision making while keeping everyone in our PCON community healthy and safe. We implemented a hybrid-teaching model this semester where the theory portion of each nursing course is taught remotely and each cohort of students has one dedicated weekly onsite day on campus.

We recently welcomed 59 new students to our traditional, weekday program. They have settled into classes now and have started their first clinical experiences at the Hospital. Thanks to the continued generosity of Bill and Sandra Pomeroy, our students are able to practice psychomotor skills in the nursing lab with newly acquired lab equipment: 9 new manikins, 7 blood pressure training arms, 7 IV training arms, 1 stretcher and 4 mobile work stations with laptops and MAK scanners. This summer our classrooms were upgraded with new smartboards thanks to the generosity of the S.I. Newhouse Foundation. Although this academic year is unlike any in our history, we will strive to make our college a special place to discover, practice and work.

December 2019 Convocation; May and June 2020 Graduate Celebrations




Newsmakers

My name is Maureen Sweet LoBello, Crouse Irving Hospital Graduate, Class of 1970.

Linda Scherfling Mayers, Edith Fish, Katherine Otrupcak Owens, Jeanne Volles Spoon and I have all remained in contact since graduation. Sadly, we recently lost another classmate and close friend: Michelle Culver Fengler.

We want to share some "fun facts" about our class:

We were the last class to enter the "old" 36-month program; the last to move into "the houses" on Irving Ave. – Bristol and North Irving – flanking the original Crouse Hospital; the last to "have" to go through "initiation" with "our Big Sisters" LOL.

Back then each specialty was a three month rotation and our class was the last

to rotate through them, including at the psychiatric hospital in Ogdensberg and three pre-divided groups for a three month rotation at St. Lawrence State Hospital. All of the major fields were three months each and we circulated with our group.

Let's not forget, Sunday through Thursday we had an 8 p.m. curfew. Friday and Saturday our curfew was midnight, and we signed out in a book that our "House Mother" would check at 10 p.m. to be sure "All were accounted for." Sunday through Thursday nights at that 8 p.m. hour was our study /quiet time, we had to be in our rooms "studying" from 8 until 10 p.m. and from 10-10:30 p.m. we could go down to the kitchen for visiting or

a snack.

This was helpful as our first year we had a Chemistry class at 8 a.m. on Saturday morning with Mr. Weist.

We were the first class to move into the Memorial Hospital dorms when the two hospitals became one, Crouse Irving Memorial Hospital.

We had the option to have our Diploma and pins read "Crouse-Irving Hospital, School of Nursing" as that was the school we entered...hence we are the last class to graduate from Crouse-Irving Hospital School of Nursing 1970! 50 years ago.

One last thing: we graduated on a beautiful sunny day in July of 1970, at Hendricks Chapel at Syracuse University. Then our State Boards were taken in the basement of the Syracuse War Memorial,

over two beautiful sunny days in mid-November of 1970. We shared the space with the "Royal Lipizan Horses" who were in town for a show and housed on the other side of a curtain wall...those with allergies knew the horses were there!

Oh, and not to forget, we received our State Board results on February 2, 1971 – Groundhog Day – another day to celebrate.


